THE WERNHER RESTAURANT
(FORMERLY THE STATE
DINING ROOM)

For exquisite fine dining there can be few more spectacular settings than the Wernher Restaurant, named after one of Luton Hoo's most distinguished former owners and occupying the sensitively restored original State Dining Rooms and Grinling Gibbons Room. This part of the Mansion House was extensively remodelled in the early

20th century by the architects of the Ritz Hotel in London and is considered one of the finest examples of the Beaux Arts style. Its exotic marble panelwork and richly coloured fabrics are reminiscent of the Palace of Versailles. Guests and visitors can dine in the place where royalty, prime ministers and heads of state were entertained – all making for a memorable and most pleasurable culinary experience.



DINING & RESTAURANTS

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ADAM'S BRASSERIE

Housed within the historic Stables building, designed by the distinguished 18th century architect Robert Adam, is Adam's Brasserie, offering a slightly more informal style of dining but with no less five-star cuisine and service. The décor of Adam's Brasserie is bright and contemporary, its walls lined with stills from many famous films and TV shows which have been shot on location at Luton Hoo. This is also a reference to the previous use of what is now the Brasserie as a cinema. Visiting royalty including Queen Mary are known to have watched films here alongside staff and members of the Wernher family as part of Christmas celebrations at the house.

PILLARED HALL, ENTRANCE HALL AND ITALIANATE DRAWING ROOM

These three rooms in the heart of the Mansion House have been perfectly restored as Luton Hoo's principal lounges where guests and visitors can enjoy light refreshments including morning coffee, afternoon tea and pre-dinner drinks. Lavishly furnished with fine fabrics, each room has a relaxed, calming atmosphere beneath stunning plasterwork, cornicing and other original Baroque features. Additionally the Drawing Room opens out onto the south terrace overlooking the formal gardens, providing for pleasant al fresco dining during the summer months.

PRIVATE DINING OPPORTUNITIES

For a special event, important business meeting or an occasion that you want to make exclusively yours, Luton Hoo offers a number of private dining opportunities. Adjacent to the Wernher Restaurant is the Grinling Gibbons Room, containing wall mounted wood carvings by the renowned artist and featuring beautifully flowing representations of flowers, leaves, shells and two groups of game birds. Other equally impressive private dining rooms are the Fabergé Suite with a banqueting capacity of 90, the Churchill Room which can accommodate 40 and the Pushkin Room where 20 people can dine. Further to this are the Capability Brown, Tilden, Mewes and Davis Rooms, each of which has a capacity of up to 50 dining guests.



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
